

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A Message from Pastor Barry: Faucet or Drain?

Are you a faucet or a drain? In your life, for those around you, do you fill their spirit? – their self-esteem? - their souls? Or are you a drain on their life-force? - their self-worth? - their passions? Do you find yourself treating those around you with compassion and empathy? Or are you cold and unconcerned? In other words, are you a Faucet Person, or a Drain Person? Faucet People fill other people to the brim – and even overflow! Drain people leave a hole, a parched emptiness in those they encounter. Faucet People spill over with love. Drain People leave others waterless, like dry, cracked earth in a draught. Jesus was a Faucet Person. He filled every person encountered. When he interacted with people, they left free and abounding in happiness. Their sins were forgiven. Their conscience was pure. If they were confused or troubled Jesus answered their questions. Pastoral Search Committee

It's been almost 2 years since the Committee first met in March of 2021.

While there is a similar submission for the January 29, 2023 Annual Meeting Report, it seems more fitting to provide a comprehensive overview of the search process since the committee was formed.

We developed a detailed church profile, which included conducting an all church survey to assess the priorities of church members. Based on the results of the survey, we determined the congregation is interested in finding a pastor with skill sets to assist the congregation in:

- Focusing on growth through meaningful sermons and faith education programs that engage and connect through multiple generations.
 - Increasing our membership through reaching out to the community and those searching for a church home.
- Finding ways to increase our congregation's involvement through church activities such as volunteering on a committee and assisting with weekly needs.

The church profile was posted to the UCC's ministry opportunities site on Sept. 1, 2021. Since then we have:

- received 66 candidate profiles, who all received an initial acknowledgement email from us
- had at least one zoom meeting with 19 candidates (and up to three meetings with some candidates)
- hosted in-person visits with four candidates and their significant other, spending several days with three of them. (Special thanks to Fred who has been a very gracious "Uber" driver and tour guide for our visitors).
- extended "offers" to two of the candidates. Both offers were declined due to personal reasons that were not attributed to our church or committee. Interestingly, both candidates accepted pastoral positions in Michigan.
 - One pastor's fiancée had better educational opportunities in her field in Michigan and stronger healthcare for her pre-existing health condition.
 - The other pastor and spouse felt a more urban setting was a better fit for their lifestyle.

Additional information you may find interesting.

- 18 candidates did not respond to our initial email.
- 11 candidates were removed from consideration by us (some before we met, others after we met)
- 32 candidates withdrew their candidacy (some before they met with us, others after meeting with us)

Our committee meets, on average, at least 2 hours per week. We did not receive many profiles this past summer so we spent time updating our profile to reflect changes that have occurred since our profile was initially published. We continue to receive very positive feedback from the candidates that our profile is well-written and that it is transparent regarding "who" our church really is, our strengths and our challenges.

Things we have learned through this process:

- Housing (real estate and/or rentals) has been a big concern. Many candidates have been living in parsonages and don't have a current home to use as equity or to offset necessary down payments. It is difficult for candidates to find affordable housing on a pastor's salary in our area due to price and availability.
- Our church not having an Open and Affirming (ONA) designation is difficult for some candidates. Some pastors
 have expressed that if our church went through the ONA process of education and determined not to become
 ONA, it would be difficult for them to stay here.
- Pastors value the "interim process" and are hesitant to pastor a church that has not addressed issues related to the departure of previous pastors. Though Pastor Barry has been an amazing Bridge Pastor, an interim has additional responsibilities to ensure a smooth transition to a new Senior Pastor.

We are in contact with our Associate Conference Minister, Pastor Rachel Bauman, on a regular basis. She and her predecessor (Pastor Ted) have provided us with much-needed advice and support during this process.

Pastor Rachel was recently at a national conference and shared some updated information that may be of interest:

- Typically, there are around 100-125 positions open denomination-wide at any one time. Currently, there are over **300** openings.
- Within the Wisconsin UCC Conference alone:
 - About 30% of the total pastoral positions in churches are open.
 - Prior to the past couple of years, Conference would receive 20-30 or more profiles each week that were forwarded to appropriate churches. Lately (the last couple years and certainly right now) they have been receiving one or two profiles each week and often these candidates are interested in positions that do not fit our profile.
- On average, it's taking 1-3 years for churches to find a settled pastor.

We appreciate you keeping our committee in your prayers. We hope to be blessed soon with a strong candidate who decides to lead our church into the future. Thank you for entrusting us with this very important responsibility.

Ash Wednesday- February 22, 6 pm at Emmanuel UCC, Dousman



Mission & Outreach



Singing Collection

Every time we worship, loose coins in the offering are donated to a Mission Partner. The coins in the metal plates make a "joyful noise," so we call this our Singing Collection.

In February our singing collection supports Lake Area Free Clinic

The Lake Area Free Clinic is an amazing place where residents of Waukesha County who lack health insurance and the ability to pay can receive free medical care, medication and practical information needed to improve their and maintain their health. Since the doors opened in July, 2001, the Lake Area Free Clinic has welcomed individuals and families who lack health insurance and whose income is below 250% of the federal poverty level. Many of these individuals work full-time, but are either not offered health insurance, or cannot afford the premiums.

The Medical Clinic was started 21 years ago by concerned and compassionate health care professionals who saw a need to offer Primary Health Care to the poor and uninsured outside of the Hospital Emergency room. Since its beginning, LAFC has served more than 8,000 patients; had more than 58,000 patient visits; had community volunteers contribute 119,000 hours of service; and secured more than \$4.1 million in free medications for patients. It is staffed by four full-time equivalent employees and more than 260 volunteers. ProHealth Care provides lab and x-ray services, and Advocate Aurora Health provides CT and MRI imaging services. Clinical rotations for health care students from Waukesha County Technical College, and other colleges and universities are also provided.

Finally, **Walgreens** cards are back! They had been unavailable for several months during 2022. We will keep a supply of \$25 cards on hand. If you need a larger denomination, \$100 cards can be ordered.

Note that we also now have cards for McDonalds, Kwik Trip grocery only, Visa (no activation fee needed), and Total Wine. If these, or any, cards do not sell in a reasonable length of time we will stop ordering them unless specifically requested.

Bruegger's has discontinued their participation in the Raise Right program so their cards are no longer available.

Special orders can be done but please note that going forward we would appreciate payment when the order is placed rather than when it is picked up. A list of cards that may be ordered is available on Sunday mornings at the table where cards are sold and in the office throughout the week.

Thank you to all the people who purchase gift cards. You continually contribute to the support of our Youth Programs.



Memorial Garden Sidewalk Proposal

The Memorial Garden Committee has been approached by several church members who desire a paved pathway to the Memorial Garden from the upper parking lot. The Memorial Garden is a beautiful final resting place for members and friends of First Congregational Church. The Garden is located near the outdoor worship area on the northeast corner of the Church grounds. Any person that uses a walker or wheelchair has a very difficult access down a grass covered grade, and the purpose of this concrete sidewalk is to make it easy to visit and spend time with a loved one that is now at rest.



The committee has a proposal from church member Gary Phillips to construct a five foot wide walkway with a turn area in the garden. We will be accepting any contributions for this project with a cutoff date of April 30. Our plan is to prepare the site and install the sidewalk before the end of May, 2023. Prior to announcing this fund raising project we have already received pledges that will pay for the majority of the costs involved. The Memorial Garden is in sound financial shape and also has monies set aside for building projects if needed.
