Christians have marked the weeks before Easter as a time of preparation since somewhere deep in the fourth century. Lent is that time — whether to prepare for baptism, or to be reunited with the church after being called out for serious ethical/moral lapses. Thus, the scriptures for the Sundays in Lent are challenging, on purpose. Like the gospel for the Third Sunday in Lent:

"At that very time there were some present who told him about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. He asked them, 'Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them—do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did." (Luke 13:1-5, NRSV)

A politician enjoying the power of violence? A tower falling on innocent people? Sounds like 2025. The people believed that bad things happened to those Galileans because they were worse sinners than others, and that those eighteen people wound up under the wrong decrepit tower as payment for their sins, receiving God's judgement by the invisible hand of bad engineering. Or dry rot.

Sure, we best the ancients when it comes to digital tech and choices on the candy aisle. But just like them, we often assume that bad things happen to bad people. Even when the evidence points the other way. Even when the scriptures are really clear that, "The rain falls on the just and the unjust alike."

Last summer way too many of the "faithful" were ready to blame the human tragedy of wildfires and hurricanes on the sins of Californians, Carolinians, or just America itself. More personally, people say similar things about cancer patients, or victims of domestic/sexual abuse, or rape. "They must have done something to deserve it." Which of course is garbage; garbage because it is not true, garbage because it exactly opposes what Jesus taught. Confronting our self-righteousness, he says, "Unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did." Here, Jesus is the Word that is "sharper than any two-edged sword." To bring us alive.

Lent is about more than the Friday night fish fry. If these words of Jesus are other than museum relics, if they live at all, then they certainly call us in Lent to strip off the self-righteousness that seduces us into "helping" God do a job which belongs to God alone. The reign of death shows up not only in tragedies or mass shootings, disease or injustice. It also shows up whenever our words or deeds oppose the grace by which God heals and makes things new.

The truth is, if my hope is built on some decrepit sense that I am less offensive to God than somebody else, that I am licensed to point the finger, then the tower is already crumbling down on top of me. But, if my hope is built on nothing less than Jesus' cross, then I am set free to give my full attention, not to another sinners' past, but to the glory of God bringing them alive out of a stone-cold tomb. Which, it turns out, is a great way to get ready for Easter.

## **Moderator Musings**

A challenge many churches face today is the inability for individual ministries or committees to look outside their own specific responsibilities for opportunities to collaborate with other groups within their organization. During my time in corporate America we called this internal focus "silo syndrome". All organizations are susceptible to this and our church is no exception.

To combat "silo syndrome" our church recently held an All Ministries Meeting where all the elected leaders of the church came together to work on the 2025 church calendar. Not only does this give a chance for leaders to see who is serving on the other ministries but we added an extra twist to the process. As we worked through the calendar each ministry was challenged to find at least one new opportunity to either assist or ask for help from another ministry. An example of this type of crossover is decorating the church for Christmas. Traditionally this had been a responsibility of just the Spirituality Ministry but it has now become a shared task between Spirituality and Welcoming. As 2025 progresses look forward to other shared ministry endeavors.

By working "outside our boxes" we can spread the work and develop new, innovative ideas for improvement. It isn't always easy to look over the edge of the silo. Sometimes you have to climb up a ways to reach the edge. But once you do look over that edge of traditional responsibilities and get a view of the breathtaking opportunities for sharing you won't ever want to climb back down.

#### **WISE-MINDFUL MOMENTS**

Our congregation has formed a mental health task force to provide educational opportunities for the congregation regarding mental health and explore the possibility of becoming a WISE congregation.

What is WISE? WISE (Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive and Engaged in mental health) is a process and designation developed by the UCC to guide congregations in educating members about mental health and learning how to be supportive of individuals in our congregation and community with mental health issues.

In May 2024, we hosted an event with Dr. Brad Riemann at our church, "The Perfect Storm: The Mental Health Crisis in the U.S." Dr. Riemann discussed the rise in rates of anxiety, depression and addiction experienced in the U.S., the effects on youth, and the impact COVID-19 had on us all. This was a well-attended event and very informative.

On February 9, 2025, a representative from NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) certified twenty-six members of our congregation in QPR (Question, Persuade, Refer), a training to recognize individuals in need of mental health assistance and appropriate action to take. The task force will provide monthly tips in the Branches and additional educational opportunities to encourage self-care and care of others.

## March's Singing Collection

March's singing collection is the Waukesha County UCC Refugee Resettlement Coalition.

A coalition of Waukesha County UCC churches are working together and with Lutheran Social Services (LSS) to support the resettlement of a seven-member family from the Democratic Republic of Congo. The family spent twelve years in a refugee camp in Malawi after fleeing their homeland.

The coalition team, which includes volunteers from our church, St John's UCC Merton, Redeemer UCC Sussex, Emmanuel UCC Dousman, and First Congregational UCC Hartland, have helped the family to obtain clothing and household items in addition to teaching them to navigate language, healthcare, grocery shopping, school, employment, laundry, transportation, and other aspects of our culture and life in the US. It has been a learning experience, not only for the family but for all of the volunteers as well.

The family's financial assistance from LSS will come to an end in March. Our regular support of the family will continue through Easter. The family has been so kind and appreciative of all the support and assistance they have received.

Though refugee resettlements to the US are currently on hold, the team hopes to continue its work in the future to assist families who come to the US looking for a safe place to live and raise their families.


