

November brings an end to all kinds of things. Leaves on trees. Baseball season. Your lawn's weekly tax on your disposable time. Any last fantasy that summer is still even vaguely nearby. The amazing colors of the leaves on the trees are themselves a sign of a death, the end of the growing season, and the coming dormancy.

Endings can be wonderfully healing, like the ending of a bad relationship. Endings can be devastating, like the loss of one you have loved deeply for a long time. In the 21st chapter of Luke Jesus talks with his disciples about the coming time when the end comes to the Jerusalem Temple itself. Even the thought of such a thing was deeply disturbing to any faithful Jewish person, and certainly to Jesus' disciples. "Teacher, when will this happen, and what are the signs leading up to it?"

"Lots of bad things will happen, deceptive people claiming to be the Messiah, blaring "I am he, now is the time!" Don't believe them! When they talk about wars and insurrections, do not be afraid, because these must happen first. Nation will rise against nation, kingdom against kingdom. There will be earthquakes, famines, plagues, and signs in the skies." In Matthew 24 he says that these are actually birth pangs for something entirely new.

Let's hold right here. Lots of devastating things are happening in the world right now, from hurricanes to grotesque genocide, to the fraying of democracy, to the unraveling of sick people's medical care. The dark "end of days" scenarios play out on our screens and steal our sleep.

But, our solace does not lie in escaping to a bunker in the hills. As Jesus said, these are birth pangs. They bring significant pain to millions both here and across the earth. They stand in witness to a muscular human sin. But, also, they are not the end. The end is in God's hands. The power that creates stars on the edge of existence, the power that raised Jesus as the first-fruits of the redemption of all creation, this power has a purpose. And that purpose is life, joy, making all things new — NOT destruction. Focusing on the fear locks us into reaction.

But there are simple ways to erode that fear. Get outside and walk. For real. Pray in silence, and just listen to the sounds of creation. Go barefoot on the ground for a few minutes (It's not frozen yet!). Play a board game with your people. Read the scriptures – the parables of Jesus, psalms – or a good fast novel. Eat together with people. Bump up the volunteer hours. Engage with others to serve your community. These, and more like them, can reset our humanity, our peace. But they all involve laying down digital triggers, and taking up basic connection in the real world. 5 minutes will shift the balance. 30 minutes is better. An afternoon will be amazing.

Yes, there is a lot to be concerned about. And yes, avoidance is no solution. But re-grounding in the presence and real-world grace of God is not only possible, it is necessary to fuel the daily work of hope. God gives us the tools. When we use them, the scary gets smaller, and the goodness in this life grows clearer.

Moderator Musings

Being the Moderator gives me a unique view of church operations. I have the opportunity to see just how hard our church staff work. I review the many Ministries and Committees that are working day in and day out to further our church's missions. And I watch the budget numbers to make sure we have the money to pay our staff salaries and various expense invoices. It is 2026 budget time and rather than think about changing leaves and Packer football I am instead thinking about revenue/expense lines and pledging.

By this time you should have received your individual pledge cards and time/talent sheets. Please give both of these documents prayerful consideration. The church does not move forward without both your financial and time gifts. We all are impacted by rising prices. So is the church. If you can increase your pledge, great! If you can't we can all certainly understand. If you can't give financially maybe you can help by volunteering to teach church school, serve Fellowship, or usher on a Sunday. Every gift, whether financial or in time, is greatly appreciated.

As my sainted mother would say, every gift given to the church is another jewel in your heavenly crown.

Mission and Outreach Singing Collection

Every time we worship, loose coins in the offering are donated to a Mission Partner. The coins in the metal plates make a "joyful noise," so we call this our Singing Collection.

November Singing Collection

The November Singing Collection benefits the Fischer House Wisconsin.

When a veteran or military service member receives care

at the VA, the last thing families should have to worry about is how to support their loved one during hospitalization. For many families, the VA Medical Center is hours from home, and it is difficult to predict how long a stay might be. Not only are there financial sacrifices with travel and lodging, but there can also be mental and emotional burdens as families seek answers and wait for medical results.

Fisher House Wisconsin hopes to lessen these burdens so families can focus on helping their loved one heal. The Milwaukee VA Fisher House is conveniently located on the Milwaukee VA Medical Center grounds and offers 16 bedroom suites of varying layouts to accommodate single travelers or larger families, at no cost to them.

Designed with the interactions of guests in mind, guests experience the feeling of being home with a shared common kitchen, laundry room, dining room, living room, family room and a large patio and yard. Families share meals together and support each other through their joys and sorrows.

The first Fisher House opened in 1991 at the National Naval Medical Center in Bethesda, Maryland. Since then, the foundation has expanded, and over 99 Fisher Houses now operate at military bases and VA medical centers across the U.S., as well as in Germany and the United Kingdom. These Fisher Houses have provided more than 12 million days of lodging to over 500,000 families, saving them \$610 million in hotel costs and ensuring they have a supportive place to stay during their loved ones' medical treatments.




Church Decorating

If you were omitted on this list, please accept my apology and feel free to let me know. It is never my intention to slight anyone. You're all AMAZING.




Parent BOOK CLUB

Last month, our children and youth had a special opportunity to serve communion for World Communion Sunday. They felt truly blessed and honored to be part of this sacred meal. We are grateful to everyone who graciously welcomed their participation. Many of our young participants shared the deep feelings they experienced while serving, noting moments where they sensed the Holy Spirit moving around them. They were inspired by the experience and are already eager to do it again!

Throughout October, our children in 4th grade and younger explored the Fruits of the Spirit, learning ways they can share love, joy, peace, and kindness with everyone they meet. MUFFINS FOR MOMS

INGREDIENTS

- 3 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp salt
- 2 tsp pumpkin pie spice
- 2 (15 oz) can pumpkin puree
- ¾ cup oil
- 4 large eggs, room temperature
- 2 ½ cup sugar (white or mix of white and brown)

Pumpkin Muffins

Makes at least 24 muffins

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F (175°C). Line muffin tin with liners or grease with nonstick spray.
- 2. In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, and pumpkin pie spice.
- 3. In a large bowl, whisk pumpkin puree, oil, eggs, and sugar until smooth.
- 4. Add dry ingredients to wet mixture and stir just until combined. Don't overmix.
- 5. Fill muffin cups about ¾ full using a scoop or spoon.
- 6. Bake for 30–35 minutes or until a toothpick inserted comes out clean.
- 7. Let cool in pan for 5 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

Note: we put the leftover streusel topping from the blueberry muffin recipe on top of these also!

HEARTS & HANDS



INGREDIENTS

Batter

- 0.75 cup salted butter, melted, half a stick of butter
- 2.25 cup granulated sugar
- 0.75 cup oil (we used grapeseed)
- 6 large eggs
- 6 cups all-purpose flour
- 6 teaspoons baking powder
- 3 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2.25 cup milk (we used whole milk)
- 1.5 teaspoon salt
- 6 cups blueberries (fresh or frozen)

Streusel Topping (made enough for 60 muffins!)

- 1.5 cup salted butter, softened
- 2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 0.5 teaspoon salt

Blueberry Muffins

Makes at least 36 muffins

INSTRUCTIONS

Prep: Preheat your oven to 375°F (190°C). Line a muffin tin with baking cups or lightly grease each cup.

Mix Wet Ingredients: In a large bowl, whisk together the sugar, melted butter, oil, eggs, and vanilla until smooth.

Add the milk and whisk again to combine.

Mix Dry Ingredients: In a separate bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder, and salt.

Combine: Add the dry ingredients to the wet mixture. Stir gently with a spatula or wooden spoon just until most

of the flour is incorporated. A few streaks are fine!

Prep Blueberries: Toss the blueberries with 2 teaspoons of flour to help keep them from sinking. Gently fold

them into the batter.

Rest: Let the batter rest for 15 minutes to help the muffins rise tall.

Fill Muffin Cups: Divide the batter evenly among the muffin cups, filling each about ¾ full. Top with a few extra blueberries if you like.

Make Streusel: In a medium bowl, combine the softened butter, flour, sugar, and salt until crumbly. Sprinkle about 1 tablespoon of streusel over each muffin.

Bake: Bake for 22–25 minutes, until the tops are golden and a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.

Cool: Let muffins cool in the pan for 5–10 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

Or enjoy them while still warm!
